Tony began his career in the police department, which he worked with for 18 months before guitting for many reasons, and beginning a new career working with IT servers, earning over £2000 a day. Despite many people believing he would be happy with such a high salary, Antonio was not satisfied; he believed there was greater good to be done.

During his work in the IT department, Antonia found out about the Whitechapel mission and decided to volunteer there for a number of days. Seeing the work that was being done to help those who had very little made him look at his own self and the privileges he acquired. After enquiring about the project, he learned that there were many unsolved problems that no one was trying to fix, so he agreed to start working at the Mission for a year and quit his current job. His 'one year' quickly became thirty-four and to this day, he still remains there with the same passion and drive he started off with.

With his wife, he guided us around the building to have a feel of how the place works and what the homeless experience. Despite learning of the difficulties the homeless go through daily, we were told that it would be impossible for privileged girls like us to understand the experiences they have to face. We were undeniably inspired by our day at this shelter and felt as though it was now our new-found duty to help out

other as often as possible.



The attraction is spread over three floors and is a third bigger than the old venue. The second speech was titled 'Snot, Sick and Scabs'. It was a very interactive workshop informing us how and why we vomit.



SALTERS FESTIVAL OF CHEMISTRY





On 13th May 2015, my three classmates and I, were chosen to go on a trip to the Salters Festival of Chemistry, held in Queen Mary University of London. Along with Ms. Iqbal, Faheemah, Maimoonah and Aiaza we attended this prestigious event; therewith the experience was divided into two parts- before and after lunch.

Firstly we had to solve the intricate problem of who killed the salt miners' manager by dividing into pairs and doing three experiments each, in turn, comparing samples of salt, ink and liquid found at the site to others (to see which matched). Maimoonah and I paired up and started doing the first experiment, which was to find out the non-metal part of the salt samples (to compare them to the sample found at the site). We found it reasonably difficult, however the next two experiments were fairly easier as we had already done something similar in school during science week. These were, respectively, a chromatography and a pH test. After both pairs completed the experiment and wrote a report on who we believed was the murderer (a man called Charlie Rock), we then had lunch.

The inside of the campus is truly beautiful, with a sub-branch of the Thames flowing through it. We ate lunch there, and afterward walked into the same building for our next experiment- the University challenge. This was only seventy-five minutes long and seemed simple. It was not. We had to make the hydrochloric acid's and sodium thiosulfate's color change in exactly one minute, while it was being combusted by the fire beneath.

What was extremely frightening was the fact that our gauze (a stand you put beakers/flasks on top of) was previously burnt, thus when we put our solution on it, huge clouds of smoke arose and personally, it was horrifying and it seemed like we were in one of those teenage movies where an experiment goes wrong and everybody goes to A&E! Everyone else found it funny!

Then we went into an auditorium where we were shown a demonstration of liquid nitrogen, dry ice and even the extremely rare liquid oxygen! The performance/presentation was amusing and perhaps something to be seen once in a lifetime. The awards were then given out, firstly to everyone who participated and then to the winners. Shockingly, the experiment I believed

I would die in was the one we won third place in (out of seventeen schools)!

Overall, I'd say it was an interesting, remarkable and highly underestimated (by me) experience, along with the intense backdrop of the competition we had fun and it is definitely something I will remember for years to come, maybe one day one of us (the four students who went) will even study there....
